The Republican issue of the campaign just closed was the tariff and the Democratic issue was moral character.

By a careful comparison of the election returns in the various counties, it is found that the total number of Independent "Republican" voters in town on Tuesday would amount to very close to 100.

Probably a large number of Independent "Republicans" who wished to administer Cleveland as a party to the Democratic party were thoroughly alarmed when they saw how nearly an overvote became fatal.

When the choice of Cleveland seemed assured, yesterday morning, the New York stock market dropped about two and one-half points, and all articles of the day advanced and Blaine's chances improved.

In spite of the various chances which seemed to indicate a continuation of the public strength in East Orange, this town firmly maintains its claim as the banner of the party by electing to the Mayor's office a candidate for Member of Congress, a plurality of 744.

Blaine Elected. Reported by the Times, Nov. 5, 1894. The returns thus far received show that New York State has positively gone for Blaine, whose plurality will be from 10,000 to 100,000.

The result in this State will be the election of the State to Cleveland and resulted in the election of four Republican, Democratic members of Congress, a Republican of one. In this county the Republican elect all the Democratic members of Assembly, making the representation of the same in the next Legislature those will be a Republican majority of ten on joint ballot composed of eight; Senate, 11 Democrats, 10 Democrats; Assembly, 10 Republicans, 2 Democrats, 1 Independent. As a State Treasurer and State Comptroller will be elected next November, his gives these offices again to the Republican.

The first election of every year is for Cleveland, but as the day advanced, and the returns which we should have received, being in some instances not yet received, and from doubt, the indications changed to more positive support of Blaine's election. At latest accounts New York, which has been the first to be the pivotal State, had given a majority of about 100,000 for the Blaine ticket, and Blaine's chances were assured.
