—The Sunday horse cars to Elizabeth arrived at 10:15.

—Sidney Young picked apple blossoms from a tree he was cutting down at Middle Brook last week.

—The Plainfield Sausage Band are to give an entertainment Thanksgiving evening, to be followed by dancing.

—The Board of Freeholders of Somerset County have authorized the Collector to borrow \$4,500 in anticipation of taxes.

—A pedlar in photographs of Cleveland and Heidelberg did a roaring business during the parade last evening, by disposing of the poor rats at five cents a pair.

—The New Jersey State Agricultural Society has declared a dividend of 8 per cent. The meeting at Waverly this year was very successful one, the receipts being \$30,375. The proceeds are \$12,500.

Supreme Court Decisions.

ROBT W. BUNYON vs. CURTIS W. HEDGECOCK On writ of error to the Superior Circuit Opinion by Beasley, Chief Justice. Held, 1. Where, by consent of parties a case is referred to the order of reference being general in its form, exceptions cannot be taken to the Judge's decision on the motion to confirm the report of the referee, such report must be treated as a verdict. 2. If the referee have proceeded illegally or decided erroneously, the remedy is the same as against a verdict similarly found, i. e., to set aside the report, and grant a new trial.

AGGAR vs. VAN DYKE. On certiorari. Opinion by Dixon, Jud. S. H. I. A special school tax, ordered by a special meeting of the voters, which was not called by the board of trustees, and of which the district clerk did not give notice, will be set aside.

REDFIELD vs. ELSTON. On application for mandamus, Opinions by Dixon Judge. A director in a private corporation prayed for a mandamus against the co-director, commanding him to let to him the former to have at all times an equal share and control with him in the management and direction of all affairs and business of the company. No interference with the petitioner's right to participate in hourly meetings was alleged. The writ was refused, on the grounds that the prayer was too general and too broad, and that the writ if issued would be practically unenforceable.
